Actor and philanthropist Shin Koyamada was recently elected the new Young Professional Member of the Sister Cities International (SCI) Board of Directors and the official SCI Country Representative for Japan & Eastern Asia. Koyamada is the first native-born Japanese member of the Board. Last April, Shin attended the 60th Sister City Anniversary Celebration between the City of San Jose and his hometown of Okayama to support their sister city programs and learn more about getting involved. Koyamada became an international celebrity after co-starring in the Tom Cruise film "The Last Samurai." On the philanthropic front, Koyamada and his wife established a nonprofit foundation in 2008 dedicated to inspiring youth to pursue their dreams.

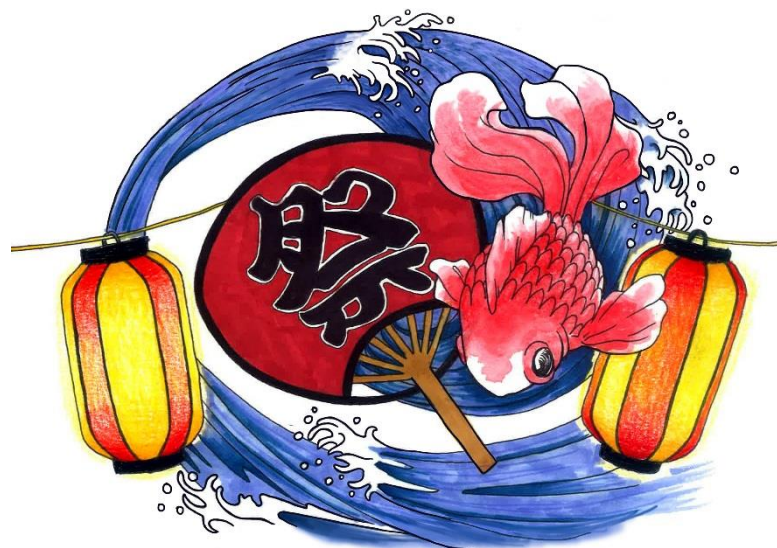
