On March 15, 2014 the sky was blue and the sun shone brightly onto the parking lot where I stood. Surrounded by my friends, we jumped up and down, excited for a bus of sixteen exchange students from Japan to arrive. I knew it was going to be amazing, but I had no idea of all the new experiences and memories I would gain.

Sayaka lida is the name of the girl who would be staying at my house for one week. When I first met her, neither of us knew what to say, then we smiled and laughed. Over the next week, we became very close friends, almost sisters. Together we went to many places, including Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk, a tour of Silicon Valley, and ice skating at Winter Lodge. This summer, many other host students are travelling to Tsuchiura, Japan. I am looking forward to reuniting with Sayaka and experiencing her culture. They are starting to prepare for their trip, which will no doubt get them more excited about their visit to Japan.
