



#### **Teaching Credential Programs for Japanese**

Teachers that wish to teach in California must have a specialized teaching credential for the subject(s) they intend to teach from a Commission-approved teacher preparation program.

Two main teaching credentials for K-12 education: Multiple Subject and Single Subject Teaching Credential. To teach Japanese, you would want to earn a **Single Subject Teaching Credential** and take **subject matter exams** for Japanese.

Public Middle School / Public High School	General Educator License	Earn Bachelor's Degree, preferably in Japanese, and pass the Praxis Core Academic Skills Test
	Secondary Single Subject License (World Languages – Japanese)	Complete secondary academic requirements and coursework for Japanese
Community College / University	Master's Degree or Doctoral Degree	Earn Master's or Doctoral Degree, preferably in linguistics, education, or Japanese pedagogy

#### Nevada Information

#### **Teaching Preparation Programs**

In order to teach Japanese at a secondary school, Teachers must first earn their Nevada educator licensure at a regionally accredited college or university before finally acquiring a Secondary Single Subject License for World Languages in Japanese through the Nevada Department of Education.

The traditional route to Nevada educator licensure includes completion of a bachelor's degree and teacher preparation program. Specific coursework is also required, including at least three semester hours of credit in education for students with disabilities and at least three semester hours of credit in parental involvement and family engagement. These courses are typically included in a Nevada-approved teacher education program. (Langcred.com)




