3/11 - 5 Years Later

Last month marked the fifth year anniversary of the devastating earthquake, tsunami, and nuclear disaster in Japan. March 11, 2011 is a day Japan definitely will not and cannot forget. Nearly 16,000 lives were lost, and whole cities were destroyed. Five years later, the Tohoku region still faces many issues stemming from that fateful day. Struggling local economies, an aging population, reconstructing schools and normalcy for children's daily lives all make for a recovery that still has a long way to go.

But many who live on today remember the kindness and friendship shown to them in their time of need. Many cities in California held fundraisers or provided other support for their Japanese sister cities in the aftermath of the crisis. This is the power of sister city relationships. These enduring bonds between California and Japanese cities will continue to bring people closer together through the good times and the bad. Japan is still on its way to recovery, but it is always a fitting time to reflect on the overwhelmingly generous and compassionate responses from Japan's sister cities in California during that difficult period.

San Jose-Okayama Sister Cities Update

Our new board started off with a bang in November 2015 when a delegation from Okayama City government, the Convention Center, and Okayama University arrived in San Jose for the opening ceremony and symposium of the Okayama University Silicon Valley Office (OUSVO). Prof. Mototaka Senda, PhD is the Director of the OUSVO and also a director of San Jose-Okayama Sister Cities.

The short 4-day visit included a wonderful and interesting symposium of Okayama University research efforts in collaboration and partnership with San Jose State University and an open house at the OUSVO in Fremont.

Presidents of both universities attended the events, as well as San Jose City Councilmember for District 3, Raul Peralez, in his first official welcome of a major event. Consul General Yamada, Deputy Consul General Watanabe, and many more from the Japanese Consulate in San Francisco were present during these events.

The involvement of the City of Okayama was very welcome, as we had not had an official delegation in some time. International Affairs Manager for the City of San Jose, Joe Hedges, arranged a number of meetings and tours for the city representatives that included a tour of the Japanese Friendship Garden in Kelly Park. The tour was led by a Parks & Recreation ranger who had actively cared for the Momotaro Statue in downtown San Jose, the koi, and the gardens themselves. It was truly a pleasure to see the excitement of our guests while walking among the carefully groomed pathways. It is a place that we will revisit in preparation for and during our 60th Anniversary celebrations in 2017.

We hope to add to this artist exchanges, performances, university symposiums, high-tech visits and workshops, convention opportunities, tours on both sides of the Pacific, and much more.
