The next student exchange between Cupertino and Toyokawa will take place this summer, and the 2013 student delegation and chaperones were introduced at the festival on April 27th. Lindsay, California and Ono, Hyogo, Japan celebrated their 40th anniversary as sister cities in April. The mayor of Ono, Tsutomu Horai, along with five others traveled to Lindsay during Lindsay's Orange Blossom Festival. Mayor Horai was the Grand Marshall in the Orange Blossom Parade on the morning of April 20, and that afternoon, a small plaza in the park, named Friendship Plaza, was dedicated to commemorate the anniversary. A banquet was held that evening to celebrate the 40th anniversary, which more than 100 guests attended.

A delegation from Lindsay, led by Mayor Ramona Padilla, will visit Ono in August during their summer festival. The visitors will also spend several days sightseeing in this historic town. The highpoint of the visit will be the signing of the 40-year renewal of the Lindsay/Ono Sister City Charter.



Logos can identify and increase recognition of your sister city organization. The Rio Vista Sister Cities Association logo (shown above) represents the connection between Rio Vista, California and Tobishima Village, Japan.

The shape symbolizes the half world that we are apart. At the center of our logo is a distinctive superstructure; the supporting cables of the Meiko West Bridge (Tobishima) overlays the flag of Japan, and the heavy steel of the Helen Medere Bridge (Rio Vista) overlays the star field of the flag of the United States, thus linking our respective communities.
