The weekend was spent sightseeing, making friends, and trying local food. Oh, and shopping. They did LOTS of shopping! As the exchange came to an end the host families said goodbye to their new friends and the group headed out for an overnight trip to San Francisco where they visited the Japanese Consulate, checked out the local sites, and enjoyed the cool Bay Area weather. Early the next day, they returned home to Kurume. In 2017 Modesto and Kurume will celebrate 25 years of friendship, and another delegation will visit Modesto to commemorate the continuation of the sister city relationship.

2016 Cupertino Student Delegation

On June 28, the 2016 Cupertino-Toyokawa Student Delegation 2016 set off for their trip to Japan. The student delegation of 14 students from the Cupertino Union School District, along with two district staff chaperones, went through hours of cultural and language classes as preparation.

The students' first stop in Japan was Nagoya in Aichi Prefecture. There, they visited the SCMAGLEV & Railway Park, Nagoya Castle, and Atsuta Shrine. Later that day, they arrived in Toyokawa and met their host families for the first time. They went sightseeing in Toyokawa, visiting Toyokawa Inari Temple (famous for its hundreds of fox statues, no two with the same expression!), and the Toyota Motor Plant in nearby Toyota City. Their first day in Toyokawa ended with a welcome reception where the delegates enjoyed conversation over dinner with the Toyokawa delegates. Cupertino students performed a medley of American music from the 1900s to the 2000s. During the Cha Cha Slide, students encouraged the audience to get on their feet and dance with them! Soon after, they returned with their host families, spending the weekend with them. Students enjoyed activities such as the nearby amusement park, Japanese spas, shopping, and getting together with other delegates.

The next two days were spent at Chubu Jr. High School. The delegation shadowed Japanese students, ate lunch together, and engaged in cultural projects such as Japanese cloisonné work, calligraphy, and stamp making. Shadowing Japanese students showed the delegates how Japanese schools compared and contrasted with their own schooling, and lunchtime was great for making friends with classmates. To conclude their visit to the school, Chubu Jr. High School hosted a farewell ceremony with team games and a Japanese taiko drum performance by one of the Cupertino delegates.

The next morning was their last in Toyokawa, with many delegates and host parents giving tearful farewells. Their next stop was Toyohashi Station where the delegation rode the Shinkansen to Kyoto. There they visited Nijo Castle, Kinkakuji, and enjoyed a kimono fashion show. After a night at their hotel, the Cupertino students visited Uzumasa Movie Town, Kiyomizudera, and the Kyoto Handicraft Center. On their last day, after touring the Fushimi Inari Shrine, they stopped at the Todaiji Temple and deer park in Nara. Finally, they made their way to Umeda Sky Building in Osaka before heading to the airport in Osaka. Welcome back, Cupertino-Toyokawa Student Delegation 2016!

Newly Revamped Student Exchange Program for 2016

This year marks a revitalization of the high school student exchange between Berkeley and Sakai as part of their sister city relationship that began 50 years ago. The nine members of the exchange included three current Berkeley-Sakai Sister City Association board members and their daughters (Cheryl and Gaby Rego, Brad and Claire McCullough, and Jay and Elah Sordean) and the twin grandchildren (Kelsey and Rachel Hirota) of one of the founders of the association, Tad Hirota, as well as their mother, Katie Sanbongi. The exchange trip took place from July 28-August 8, 2016.

During their stay in Sakai, the Berkeley exchange students interacted with Sakai high school students and their families, talking about differences and similarities in culture, government, business, food, teen interests, etcetera. The Berkeley guests taught their hosts how to make pizza and gave food-related presentations, and the Sakai hosts treated the Berkeley students to Sakai culture and tradition by having them sell various live food from the sea standing on a platform in front of thousands of people while dressed in fancy yukata as part of the 700-year old Sakai Grand Evening Fish Market. Their stay in Sakai also included time spent on activities with their host families, meeting with the Mayor and other government officials of Sakai, touring local businesses, and learning the tea ceremony.

After visiting Sakai, the group spent three nights in Kyoto and then on to Hiroshima for two nights before returning home. In Hiroshima, they attended the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Ceremony, held each year

on August 6, the anniversary of the atomic bombing of Hiroshima. The ceremony included an activity called Light and Music for Peace, which involved setting lanterns afloat with thousands of others in a show of remembrance and honor for those no longer with us.
